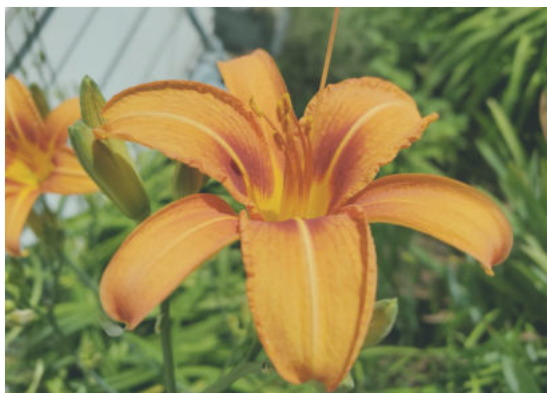

Shh! This is a Library!

You may have heard the above cliché in reference to libraries—and, if you've visited the Fort Plain Free Library recently, you may also know that it's wildly outdated. Sure, we *do* have quiet spaces available (as the tutors, students, and other patrons working and studying here can attest). But on any given day, our library is a place where you can hear *many* noises, including:

Kids blowing giant bubbles and performing other science experiments at Camp Curiosity (a new program for students ages 8 to 13, so successful that we brought it back for a second run during our Summer Reading Program).

The sounds of several different instruments drifting out of our music room, where we offer free music lessons (and if you're here in the evening, you may also hear the practice sessions of our Library Ensemble, which had its first public performance at last year's Winter Open House).

Lively debates and passionate opinions at our book discussion group (which just saw its highest attendance ever in January, after more than a year of reading and discussing a new book every month).

Ideas and inspiration shared by participants in Kids of Earth, a new student-led group focusing on how kids can practice conservation in their communities.



And that's only a small sample of the programs offered here, which also include debates and discussions at the Philo Cafe, paint-along events for all ages, afternoons devoted to Lego building and cookie decorating, and much more. Beyond the boundaries of the library itself, we've been delighted to continue visiting the preschool classes at Harry Hoag Elementary School, and to participate in last summer's Water Music New York Festival (where we created a special set of trading cards honoring the Erie Canal's 200th birthday). We were also proud to host a food drive in November, collecting donations to benefit the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry here in Fort Plain.



In all the noises of our library, we're privileged to hear the sounds of a vibrant community: people looking for things to do, sharing their knowledge and passions with one another, and fostering a love of reading in the next generation. The talent, joy, and excitement that can be found in Fort Plain are abundant when spending a day in the library. We're proud to be a place where the people of our community can flourish.

There is, of course, another sound that can often be heard at the library: questions and comments from patrons who've come to visit. And while almost all of this feedback is positive, there is one bittersweet phrase we occasionally hear, usually uttered by patrons who are surprised and delighted to find a library like ours in Fort Plain: "I didn't even know this place was here!"

Clearly, this will not do. Our goal for 2026 is to make sure that everyone knows we're here, and that they also know what a wonderful community we're a part of. We hope you'll help us spread the word—and as always, we'll see you at the library.

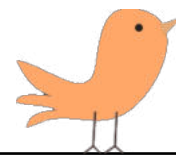

Weekly Morning Story Time

Every Tuesday - year round



Led each week by Linda Kellett, Story Time is a program featuring interactive stories, crafts, and songs for toddlers and preschoolers. Through imaginative art projects, sing-alongs teaching basic sign language, and access to a wide variety of educational toys (along with many more activities), this program offers children a chance to develop social skills and learn new concepts via creative play.

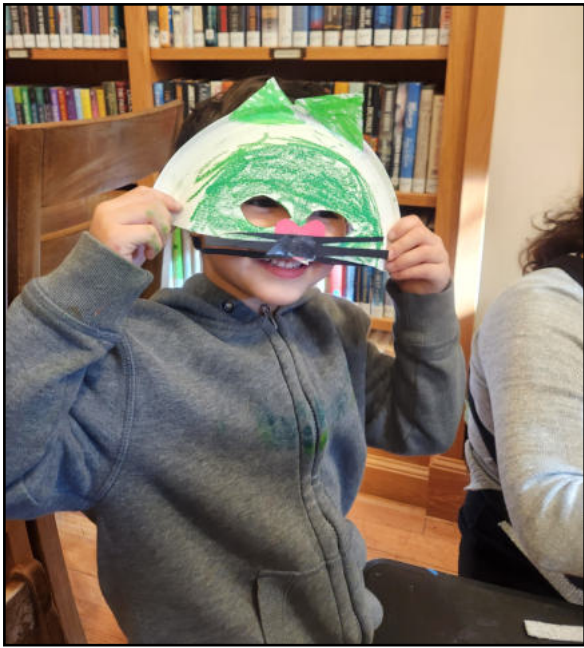


In addition to the structured portion of Story Time, a wide variety of open play activities—including blocks, marble runs, wooden train sets, letter and picture puzzles, and more—allow children of various ages to learn and explore new concepts at their own pace.

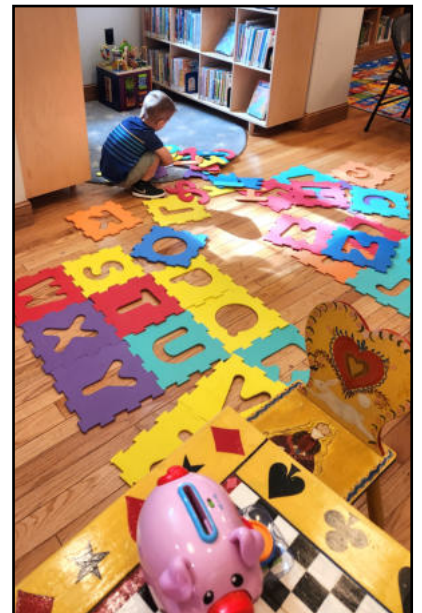

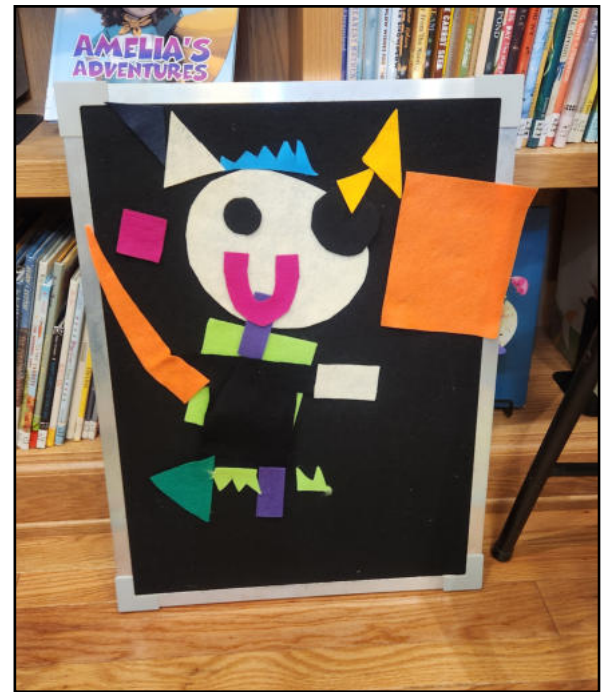
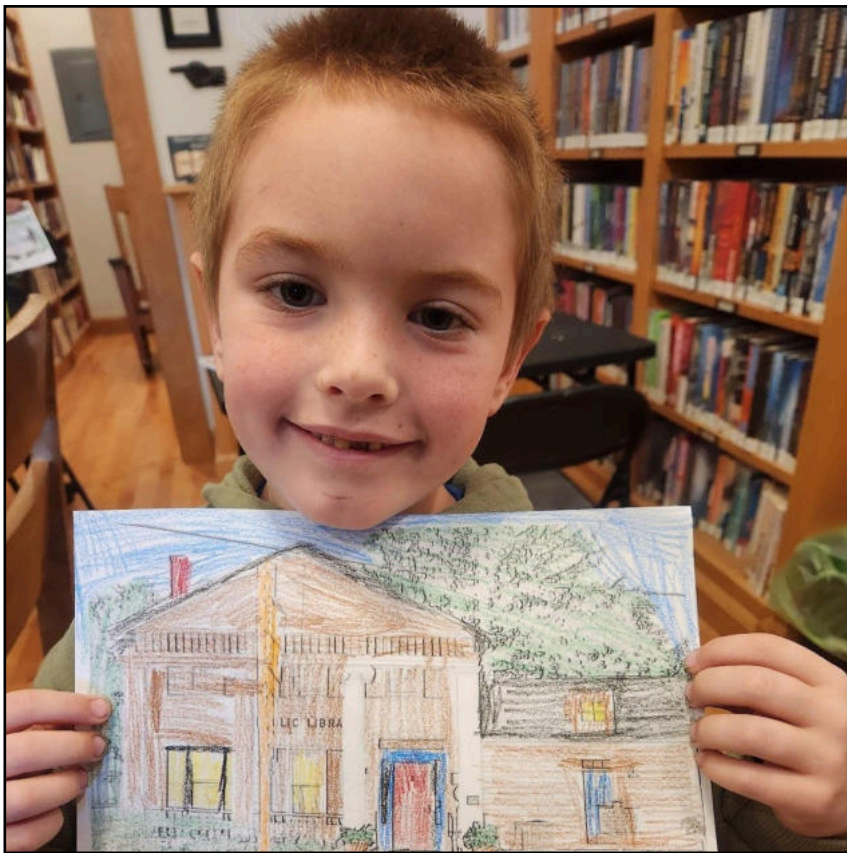
Bi-monthly First Grade Programs at the Library

Our collaboration with the Harry Hoag School's first grade classes consists of interactive programs with a focus on library literacy skills (for example, learning the difference between fiction and nonfiction). Every other month, the classes are bussed to the library for a half hour of instruction and fun. Each session consists of a story and/or activity such as the introductory tour and scavenger hunt, the creation of a class book, and a final culminating program during which students get an invitation to get their own library cards.

The goal is to make the students and their families aware of all the public library has to offer. We want to make the library a destination: a place to learn, to have fun, to meet people with similar hobbies and interests, to gain access to a wealth of information and materials, and to develop a lifelong love of reading.

We appreciate the school's and teachers' willingness to partner with us in both of these educational programs!

Each month, we visit the Harry Hoag School's pre-kindergarten classes for half-hour story time programs. Each educational, interactive program consists of a story, songs, action rhymes, and an age-appropriate craft. The goal is to spark a love of reading.

The activities are engaging and fun, but they also foster the development of early literacy and cognitive skills such as eye-hand coordination, visual perception, motor coordination, color identification, and more. The collaborative partnership with the school allows us to introduce the students to the Fort Plain Free Library, creating a positive (and hopefully lasting) impression about what we have to offer.



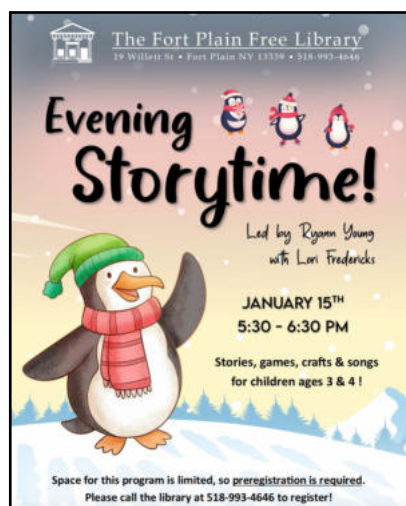

Léon Foucault was a French physicist who named the gyroscope. In 1852 he created a gyroscope which was sensitive enough to detect the Earth's rotation. His earlier experiments with pendulums proved that the Earth rotates on its axis.

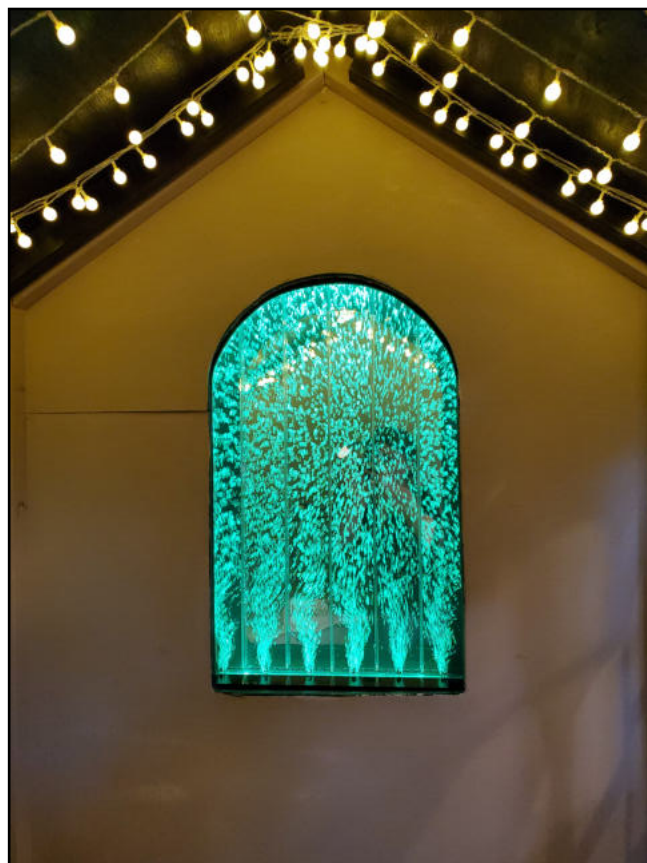

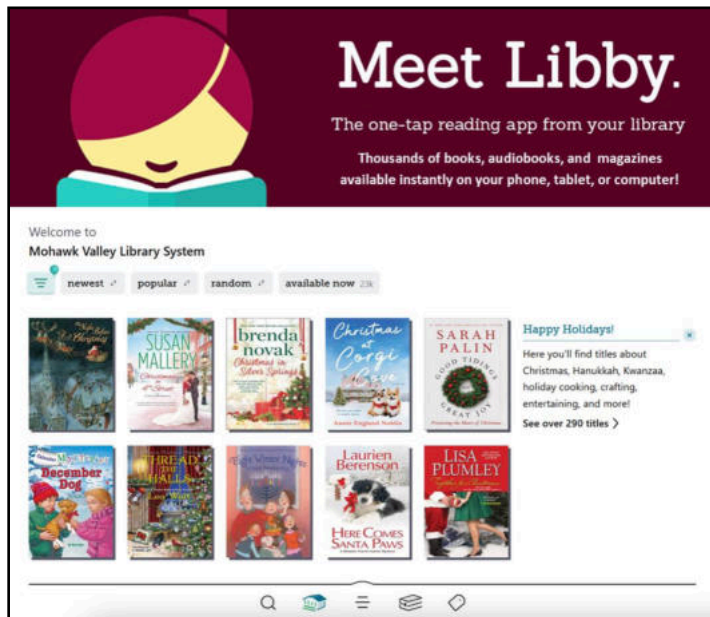

Can you have too many cookbooks?

A massive book donation that arrived at our library this spring contained an unexpected surprise: more than 3,600 recipe pamphlets, compiled from communities and organizations across the country. Hoping to keep this extraordinary collection in one piece, we reached out to Kansas State University, who graciously agreed to accept these materials into their foodways collection.



Kansas State University's 'cookery collection' is the largest collection of its kind that is available at a public university. Many of the cookbooks represent a specific place and time, allowing researchers insight about the socio-economic status of the cookbooks' contributors as well as what ingredients were available in that location at the time the cookbook was published.' 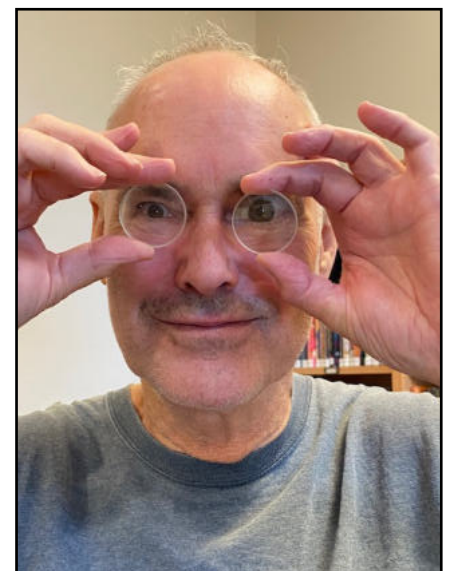

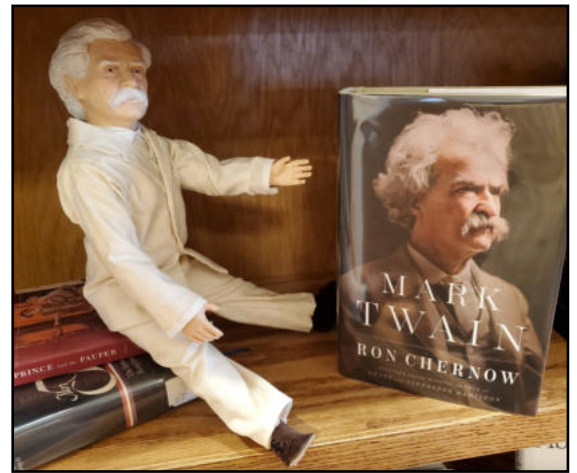

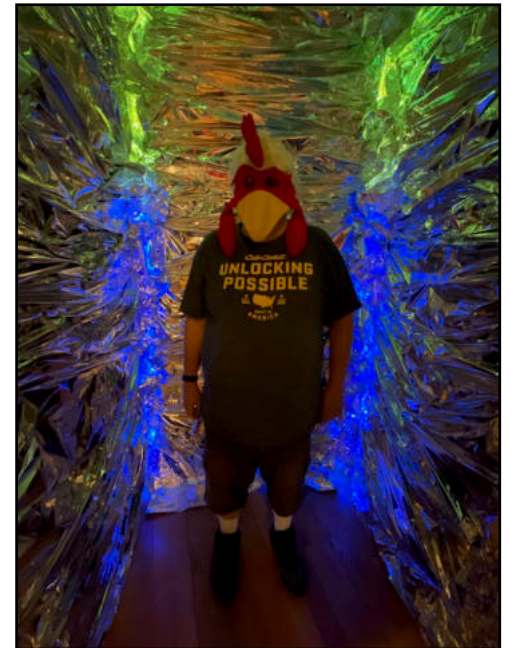

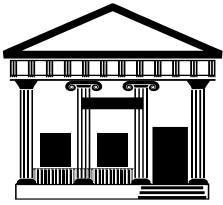
